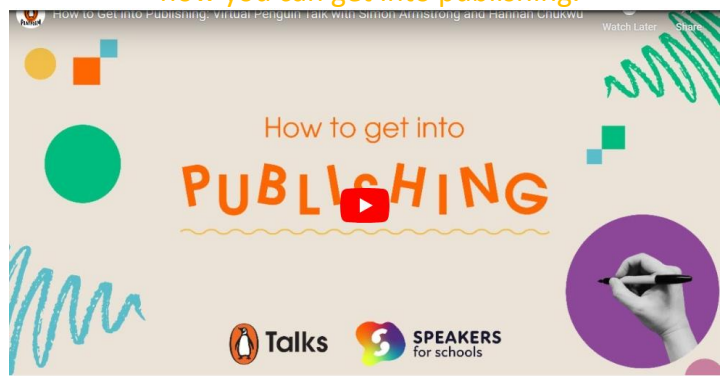


Be inspired by people using English in real-life jobs. Find out how much you could get paid for different roles and what qualifications you might need.

If you can't imagine what it would be like to study English Literature full time click on the picture to read about the experiences of students at Oxford.

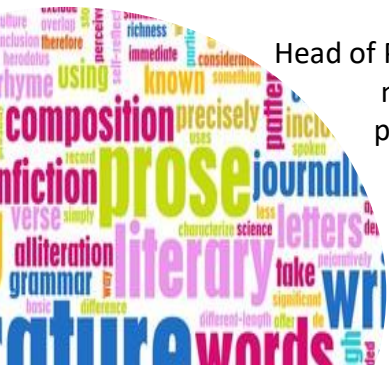
