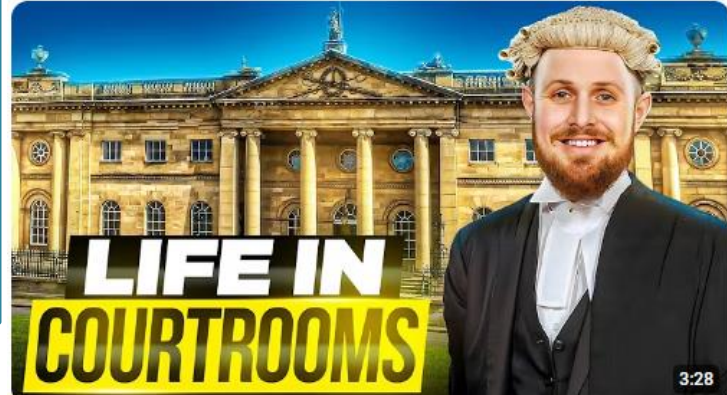


SCHEME OF THE WEEK
